A Word from the Pastor

"No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us."

-1 John 4:12 (NRSV)

I hope by now most of you have seen the new sign over our future home at 660 NW Gilman Blvd., Unit C-5. The sign includes the logo of American Baptist Churches USA (the world with a cross superimposed) and it can be seen very clearly. I will help people to clearly see that they have found our building. There is also a small 8 ½ X 11 sign on the door which helps people see that this is the future home of our church family, and which includes our contact information for people who are interested in learning more about us. These are important signs because they help make people aware of our plans as a church.

Still, these are not the most important "signs" our church has.

Our church's most important signs are you, our members. That's right, you also are one of our church's signs. You are a sign because your life points to what the true nature of our church is, and beyond that to the nature of the God we worship. The passage above from 1 John tells us that if we love those around us, then we help the people around us see an un-seeable God. So, another way of saying that is that we become a sign for who God is and how God can be found. A song we frequently sing in worship declares, "They'll know we are Christians by our Love." It's a great song with an important truth. But even more important is the similar message in the above passage of scripture: *They'll know who GOD IS by our love*. When we love in Christ's name, people learn there is a God who not only *IS* love, but who loves *THEM* in particular.

Let's be good church signs, which point people to a loving church and a loving Lord. There are many good ways to do this: (1) when you see someone in need, ask that good old question, "What would Jesus do?" and then respond to them in love. Remember Christ said that inasmuch as we love the homeless, the hungry and the one without adequate clothing, we do it to Him; (2) when you see someone who is new to the community, welcome them! Point them to our church as a place where they can find a true, caring spiritual family. Remember Christ also said that inasmuch as we welcome the stranger, we welcome Him; and (3) listen to people with the ears of our Savior - show you are interested in them, in what they think, what they believe, and in what they long for. These are not "church marketing tricks" designed to grow our church, regardless of the needs of the people we meet. Rather, this is what we are called to do in order to point to the reality of God's love, regardless of whether our church directly benefits.

The blue sign over the entrance to our new home will be an important tool for us in our ministry. But neither that sign nor the building we will occupy will do that ministry for us. That job will be ours alone.

Just Come Near

Rev Stuart Sacks was serving in Paraguay when Rafael, a Maka Indian, came and sat on his porch. Sacks, who'd been inside eating, went out to see what the man wanted. Rafael said, "Ham, henek met," which means "I don't want anything; I have just come near.".

The pastor, not understanding the significance of that statement, again asked what he could do for Rafael. But the answer was the same.

When Sacks later shared the incident, a veteran missionary explained it was Rafael's way of showing honor. He didn't need anything in particular; he just wanted to sit on the pastor's porch. He found satisfaction and pleasure merely by being near him.

Sacks points out that the phrase "Ham, henek met" also reveals the heart of true worship. When the Lord asks, "What brings you here, my child?" we don't need to mention or ask for anything specific. We can reply that we simply want to come near our God.

Food for Thought

This month I am continuing with the Scripture Cake recipe featured in last month's Bell (July 2014). Before I can start baking, I need to read through the Bible passages listed in the ingredients and try to figure out what is being called for in the recipe. Last month I told you that I saw an Internet "cheat" that said the first ingredient – 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups First Kings 4:22 – was figs. Wrong! It is fine flour. What a relief because I have never bought figs before and it really didn't sound all that appetizing to have 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups worth of them in a cake.

I think it is going to take me awhile to get all these ingredients deciphered because I was completely distracted by reading First Kings. The introduction in my Bible said that the lessons from this chapter are woven through the stories of four men. Once you get past all the passages about how they organized the kingdom, there is some very good practical instruction for our lives. I found Chapter One absolutely gripping! The story of King David and his son Solomon is a classic plot line for many movies and novels. I was really impressed by how Solomon treated Adonijah, the guy who tried to get the throne first. Solomon practiced forgiveness in a manner that is inspiring to me as I consider my own leadership skills. We are not kings (or queens), but we can rule humbly in our own little worlds.


I will keep working on my next ingredients. But, for now, I need to keep reading and see what happened to Solomon.
