#### **Making Room for Jesus**

"[Joseph] also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn."

Luke 2:4-7

Such a familiar story – especially at this time of year. But do we take time to fully realize its implications for us and our day? The Son of God was born into this world, but there was no room for Him. No room for Him, even though the people of Israel had been expecting the Messiah for centuries. Why do you suppose that was?

We set up the routines of our life, leaving little to no room for God. Oh, yeah, except for an hour or so on Sunday morning. So, when He comes to us, as He always does, we have no room for Him.

- We have no room for Jesus when He wants to give guidance for our life, because we already have our life planned out.
- We have no room for Jesus to heal our blindness, because we believe we already see.
- We have no room for God to get close to us, because we have filled the spaces close

to us with things.

- We have no room in our budget for God because we committed all we have to the things of this world.
- We have no room in our schedule for caring for others in Christ's name because we are spending so much time making sure we can take care of ourselves without having to trust God.

When Joseph and Mary could find no room, God MADE room. Because the places for people, the inns, were all filled up, God provided room for them in the place where animals were kept. Tradition pictures a stable of wood, but more ancient sources refer to a place for keeping animals in a cave. Whichever was the case, it was not a place of comfort. Joseph and Mary did the best they could, making a crib out of a manger where the animals ate.

This Christmas, let's MAKE ROOM for Christ. Let's make room in our society for Christ, by declaring to all the "reason for the season", that God sent His Son to bring us redemption and new life. And let's make room for Jesus in our own hearts and lives, by giving acts of devotion and service priority places, not the left over stables of our lives, but the prime places, the time in our schedule nothing else can take away from Him. Only then will we have truly learned from this ancient Christmas story.

#### Navigating the Elder Care Maze

- "I need to find assisted living for my mom."
- "My father-in-law doesn't drive and can't use Metro. He needs information on transportation options."
- "I'm providing regular care for my adult son, who has a disability. I need help!" "Who do I call?!"

Do those questions sound familiar? Finding help for an older adult – yourself or a loved one – can be a daunting task. Fortunately, two local programs provide guidance in navigating the maze of community and government programs:

Senior Information & Assistance (1-888-4ELDERS) is the go-to number for anyone age 60+ and their family members who needs help identifying resources that meet their needs. <a href="http://www.agingkingcounty.org/consumers/sixty\_plus.htm">http://www.agingkingcounty.org/consumers/sixty\_plus.htm</a>

The <u>King County Caregiver Support Network</u> provides guidance to unpaid primary caregivers of adults of any age who are unable to care for themselves – typically family members or close friends or neighbors. <a href="http://www.kccaregiver.org">http://www.kccaregiver.org</a>

Aging and Disability Services (ADS) – the Area Agency on Aging for Seattle-King County – currently funds both programs. In the coming year, services may be enhanced to help a broader range of older adults and individuals with disabilities plan to live independently in the community.

## Food for Thought

Every year I enjoy baking Christmas cookies for my family and friends. I will admit that I can get overly ambitious. My "Cookies to Bake" wish list can get so long that it can become more of a dream than actual tins filled with cookies. Each recipe holds a memory – some new and some lovely old ones. When I make the Krumkaka (a thin, rolled cookie) I think of my grandma and how she spent hours making these light, airy gems one at a time on a stove top cookie griddle. I started out with the same process, but several years ago I discovered the electric griddle and now I have doubled my output: the new machine makes two cookies at a time. I have a recent peanut brittle recipe that my mother especially loves. I always think of her while I am stirring the scary, hot kettle of candy and squinting through the steam at the thermometer hanging on the side of the pot. It gets a little intimidating waiting for that magical moment when the temperature is high enough to take it off the burner and finally add the peanuts. Whew!

This year my list is just as long as it is every year, but I have a new one to try from our 1990 Family Favorites cookbook from the Community Baptist Church. I hope you will try it, too.

Confection Cookies submitted by Wilma Hill

2 1/4 cups flour

½ cup powdered sugar

1 cup shortening or margarine

1 tsp. vanilla or almond flavoring

3/4 cup nuts of your choice

½ cup coconut (optional)

Sift flour and sugar. Add shortening and other ingredients. Mix well with hands until it forms a ball. Take small portions and roll into small balls. Bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes or more. Remove before brown. After they have cooled, put them in a container or plastic bag with some powdered sugar and shake until covered.
