A Word from the Pastor

"In this is love, not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins."

-1 John 4:10 (NRSV)

February is the month of Valentine's Day, the month of love. But we get so many confusing messages from our culture and those around us about what love is.

Of course, much of our culture identifies love with sex. Sex is good and created by God, but is it the same as love? Many people today use sex as a weapon, not only in sexual abuse, but in using sex as a commercial or manipulative lure. AIDS, unwed mothers on public assistance, incest and rape, are all societal problems we have because of the abuse of sex.

Others use a false kind of love to manipulate. Marie on the sitcom *Everybody Loves Raymond*, is an example of the kind of person who manipulates her family and then says, "I only do this out of love!"

With so many abusing the concept of love, how do we know what real love is? The Bible tells us that we know what love is by seeing how God loved us! Because God loves us he made the beautiful world we so much enjoy in Issaquah. Because God loves us, he gave us friends and

family to care for and support us. Because God loves us, he sent his Son Jesus Christ to face the injustices we have to face, to suffer like we sometimes suffer, and to die on a cross. As we think about what love means in this month of Valentine's Day, we should think first and foremost of what God has done for us, and then seek to emulate it. Like God loves us without any self-focused motivation, so we should love. In the Greek language (the language is which the New Testament was originally written) there were three words for "love": eros, which refers to sexual or romantic love; philios, which refers to brotherly (or sisterly) love; and agape, love which is unconditional and hence like God's love for us

Like God showed his love in action (creating our world, sending his Son to die on a cross), so we should show our love in action, not just empty words. That's why we get involved in helping Haiti. That's why we help with the winter clothing drive, the Mayor's Month of Concern, the Tools for School drive and the Holiday Gift Barn. And that is why we seek to show interest and concern for every person who visits us in worship, regardless of their economic status, their age or the culture out of

which they have come. Like God gave of clothing drive. Let's do it through just himself sacrificially, so sometimes love is opening our hearts and loving our not always "convenient" for us, and we must give sacrificially.

This February, let's give a "Valentine" to the community of Issaquah, by seeking to love the people around us in the same way God loves us. Let's do it through helping the needy through the winter

neighbors. Let's do it through showing extra patience with the hard-to-love in our own families. Maybe in this way we can help our world get a clearer view of what love is.

We will have lots of great music, a special concert on Saturday evening followed by a hymn sin, morning devotions (printed and in a group setting), and lots of good fellowship.



Over the edge

In Iceland, a country filled with many spectacular waterfalls, Godafoss stands out. Water plunges from 40 feet high, across a width of almost 100 feet.

The story behind that natural wonder's name is impressive, as well. In the year 1000, a handful of Iceland's leaders chose to follow Christianity rather than paganism, setting the course for the entire nation. When a former pagan priest converted to Christianity, he chucked his idols into the waterfall. Civil war was averted, and the waterfall came to be known as Godafoss, or "waterfall of the gods."

Law's or love?

Businessman John Barrier, unrecognizable in jeans and a T-shirt, cashed a check at his longtime bank. But the teller refused to validate his parking ticket, saying Barrier hadn't made an official transaction. A manager agreed, saying rules were rules.

Barrier then performed a major transaction, withdrawing \$1 million and taking it elsewhere. He got his parking ticket validated after all.

What a great illustration of the perils of legalism, when man-made laws become more important than people. Jesus repeatedly healed and "worked" on the Sabbath, much to the dismay of religious leaders. He was concerned about people's hearts, not their appearance.

What matters more to you: laws or love? Appearance or substance? A heart examination may be in order!

Proposed Constitutional Amendment

The Church Board has proposed amending the constitution in relation to how Memorial Gifts are handled. Presently, Article IX, Section 4, of the church constitution says:

"The Memorial Gifts Committee shall consist of three members, elected annually. Each year this committee shall select one of its members as Chairperson.

- a. Duties and responsibilities of the committee are:
 - 1. To record all gifts to the church designated as memorial gifts.
 - 2. To disperse the gifts as designated by the giver (if the purpose of the gifts was not indicated by the givers, the committee may disperse them in the interest of the church on its own discretion up to the amount of \$1,500; if the amount is higher, Church Board approval is necessary);
 - 3. To acknowledge gifts through thank you cards, letters or other communications.
 - 4. To encourage the giving of memorial gifts."

The proposed amendment would eliminate this committee and give the Deacons the responsibility of supervising the use of these gifts. This amendment will be voted on at the Annual Meeting on February 8th.

Lenten living

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 18th this year. Christians have observed this season of the church year wince the fourth century. It's traditionally a time of reflection, penitence and spiritual renewal before Easter.

During Lent, some Christians give up something that hinders their relationship with God. Others do something extra for their spiritual growth or make a special sacrifice. The key is to make Lent a memorable season of sincere spiritual growth—a time that can set the tone for the rest of the year.

Paul Smith (1921-2007) dug deep to summon incredible gifts of creativity and perseverance. Born with severe cerebral palsy, he started making art at age 11 on an old typewriter. Steadying one hand with the other so he could use one finger to make one deliberate keystroke at a time, he typed symbols, such as # or @, using a black or colored ribbon. In this painstaking way, he "painted" stunningly detailed pictures. In a TV report from 2004 (search "Typewriter Artist" on YouTube), a friend says Smith found joy in being creative, and saw that as his life's purpose. When someone would say, "I could never do that," the artist would answer, "What can you do?" Whatever our challenges, God has given us all gifts to share with the world. Perhaps you can't "paint" pictures with a typewriter . . . But what can you do? Do it!
