A Word from the Pastor

"There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love."

-1 John 4:18 (NRSV)

A few years ago there was a "reality show" on television called *The Fear Factor*. In the show people competed against each other in overcoming fearful situations. The show did quite well for a few years before flaming out.

I wish that the "fear factor" would similarly "flame out" in relation to religion and politics. For many people the promotion of religion in general and Christian faith in particular has to do with inciting fear. The central motivator to Christian faith is to incite a fear of hell in people. Faith is little more than eternal fire insurance. Books like the *Left Behind* series play upon this even more by trying to make people fearful of a violent end of time where God comes in and wipes out the unbelieving world.

Present-day American politics has much of this fear factor in it as well. "Immigrants are trying to take over our country!" "Islam is out to destroy us!" "Gays and Lesbians are waging war on the family!" "The government is trying to take away all of our guns so they can make us a dictatorship!" Many people, from many different perspectives, try to make things go their way through manipulation of people by fear. It's like the only motivator strong enough to change people is fear, so let's ramp that fear up as much as we can to get people to do what we want.

In light of this approach, the letter of 1 John comes to us with a decidedly different approach. "There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear..." Jesus Christ came into the world not to ramp up our fear of God and death, not to wave punishment in front of our face, but to love us, to tell us "fear not, I am with you" and to take our punishment upon him. That's because God understands that love is a better motivator of human behavior than is fear. Why shouldn't that be so? The Bible tells us that we were made in His Image, in the Image of the one who IS love! (Gen. 1:26; 1 John 4:7-8).

Some might point out that this conflicts with how the Old Testament speaks of a fearsome God who destroys the world in a flood, and rains down hail and brimstone on a sinful city, or who orders war as retribution. But even in the Old Testament that is only part of the picture. There are nearly a hundred times in the Bible where God calls us to "Do not be afraid," or "Fear not." Favorites of mine include: "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble, Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change, though the mountains shake in the heart of the sea..." (Psalm 46:1-2); and "...do not

be frightened or dismayed for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go" (Joshua 1:9).

"Perfect love casts out fear." Maybe the reason this is true is because when you know God is love, and when you know God is in

ultimate control, what is there to be afraid of? So, instead of trying to fill people with fear in order to control them, why not try to fill them with the love of God in order to set them free?

Food for Thought

Last Sunday Pastor Keith helped us understand the scripture reading: Acts 17:1-9. I felt very motivated to spend more time reading and trying to learn from Bible passages such as these. And, then... lo and behold, I open the church cookbook and read the perfect example of a Bible treasure hunt: a recipe for Scripture Cake. (The recipe was a contribution from Helen Thomas.)

Each of the cake ingredients reference a Bible verse - in order to make the cake the cook must research the passages and figure out the "clues" for the ingredient. According to Internet sources, mothers used recipes for Scripture Cake (also known as Bible Cake, Scriptural Cake, and Old Testament Cake) to teach girls how to bake and to learn their Bible verses. Some researchers believe that these recipes originated in the 1700's.

I am eager to spend the next few weeks discovering the ingredients for this cake and I invite you to join me. (Note: there are plenty of cheats on the Internet that I have tried my best to avoid looking at. I have to be honest — I am pretty sure I saw that the first ingredient is figs.)

3 ½ c. First Kings 4:22 ½ c. Judges 4:19

1 c. Judges 5:25 6 Tbsp. First Samuel 14:25

2 c. Jeremiah 6:20 2 tsp. Amos 4:5

2 c. First Samuel 30:12 1 pinch Leviticus 2:13

2 c. Nahum 3:12 season to taste with II Chronicles 9:9

3 c. Jeremiah 17:11

2 c. Numbers 17:8

Mix together and bake as you would any fruit cake, in a low oven at 275 degrees, for about 1 hour or until toothpick inserted in cake comes out clean.
