<u>A Word from the</u> <u>Pastor</u>—Shoes

Until last week, my favorite pair of church shoes were in bad shape. For two years, they had slogged through Texas heat and sloshed in Washington rain, held me up in the

Sunday pulpit, and heeled it across parking lots and lawns. Finally, the work that had been done in them was showing up on their scuffed and scruffy sides.

But last week, enough was enough. Not willing to give up on these, the most comfortable church shoes in the world, I summoned all of my expertise as the eldest daughter of an inveterate shoe salesman, and brought out the shoe polish.

Wow—what a difference. A little bit of shoe polish and a soft cloth went a long ways. What was cracked became supple. What was worn took on new life.

As I was polishing my shoes and thinking about all of the places they had taken me, I began to think about 1 Corinthians 12:

"The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!" On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable."

Of all parts of the body, my feet and the shoes that go on them are the parts I think about the least. But without them, I couldn't do many—if not most—of the activities I love.

How many times in our life do we take for granted the very things that make our lives what they are? How often do we let the "feet" of our lives—the people, places and things that ground us and give us life—get scruffy and uncared for? How often do we not take the time to care for the indispensable, but often forgotten gifts that God has given us?

Caring for what God has given us doesn't always need a lot of time. Like with my shoes, it might mean taking just 20 minutes to polish up a longstanding friendship with a phone call or ten seconds to make sure things are put back as they should be.

With a moment's pause and a little bit of polish, what might have seemed old can again become new, and we will be reminded that what is weak is often indispensable.

Library Wall Art (Entry)



Zoom out

On a computer screen, images can be magnified to show tiny details and make text easier to read. In the process, however, the "big picture" is lost. After checking various aspects of a project closely, it's a good idea to "zoom out" again to be sure everything still looks as it should.

Likewise it's easy to fixate on the tiny details of our lives (especially flaws in ourselves and others). We tend to enlarge our problems far beyond their actual size and totally miss problems taking a toll elsewhere. We may also forget the beautiful "big picture" of God's care encompassing us. After tending to life's details, it's important to take a broader view to see whether our up-close perceptions hold true when we gaze on the work as a whole.

"Help us 'zoom out,' oh God," prays Joshua DuBois in *The President's Devotional* (HarperOne). "Widen our perspective and extend our horizon, so that we can more fully know your purpose this day, and every day."
