A Word from the Pastor

"As long as the earth endures,
Seedtime and harvest, cold and heat,
Summer and winter, day and night,
Shall not cease."

-Genesis 8:22 (NRSV)

The seasons here in the Pacific Northwest don't always line up with what the rest of the country think of as the seasons. Our rainy time generally lasts through June and well into July, while our Summer just as often perseveres into October. Of course, being in the Pacific Northwest, one can never predict what will happen for sure!

The one thing we can say for sure, even in the Pacific Northwest, is that life is seasonal, and seasons change. The Scripture above from Genesis is meant as a reassurance after the destruction of the Flood of Noah: seasonal changes mean that life goes on. But sometimes we are not reassured by seasonal change. Perhaps we hate to see the signs that the sunny Summer is moving on and we are heading back to times of overcast skies. We can talk all we want about how the rains of the Northwest are necessary to keep our beautiful area of the country green, but we still hate to say good-bye to warm days of sunshine! Having said this, I realize that not all of us react the same. Some are glad to leave days behind that make them uncomfortably warm, and they prefer the

cooler climate. When the seasons change, some of us must adapt to a time of the year we like less well, while others make the more welcome adaptation to the time of the year they prefer.

All of life is seasonal. A traditional perspective is that our youth is like Springtime, when all around us is full of life and promise. Of course, sometimes we forget that Springtime is also full of storms which threaten to blow us away (I'm writing especially as a former Kansan here!) Our middle years are often seen as like Summer, a time of productivity, of going out and getting things done, a time which can sometimes also be grueling. Fall, perhaps representing our 50s and 60's, is a more laid-back time, a time of great beauty, but also a time when we start to see the signs that that which used to be alive is starting to die. Winter is a favorite time for many, a time when snow can add a gentleness to life, and where life slows down a little, but often in a way that each moment can be treasured. Each season of life has its beauty, but we often move from one to the other with regret.

Maybe it would be good to add a few insights to this seasonal view of life. One is that we do well to enjoy the beauty of the season we are in. Young people need to not try to grow up too quickly, and the older of

us need to stop pretending we are young. There is always something to enjoy. I like the bumper sticker which says, "If I knew how great grandchildren were, I would have had them first!" (No offense to my children, but I have really enjoyed Abel!) I know, it doesn't make sense, but the kernel of truth in there is that you cannot have the joy of grandchildren unless you are old. A second insight we might think about, though, is that not all aspects of who we are lives in the same season. For some of us, we have a creative side, or a sensitive, feeling side, which was not even born until we were well

into our adult years. Let it have its Springtime! And a third and final insight is part of our traditional hope: even as Spring resurrects Winter's world, so resurrection to a living hope waits for all of us beyond all the winters of this world.

Pumpkin Muffins Submitted by Esther Lawson

1 c. pumpkin

1 c. sugar

2 c. flour

1 large or 2 small eggs

1 tsp. soda (put in flour)

½ tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. vanilla

 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. oleo (my grandma always used this word – in case you don't know, it is margarine or you could substitute butter)

1 c. raisins

½ c. chopped walnuts


In large bowl put pumpkin, oleo, lightly beaten egg, cinnamon and vanilla; stir well. Add flour and soda; stir well. Add raisins and walnuts. Put in muffin pan and let raise about 5 minutes. Bake at 350 degrees about 20 minutes.
